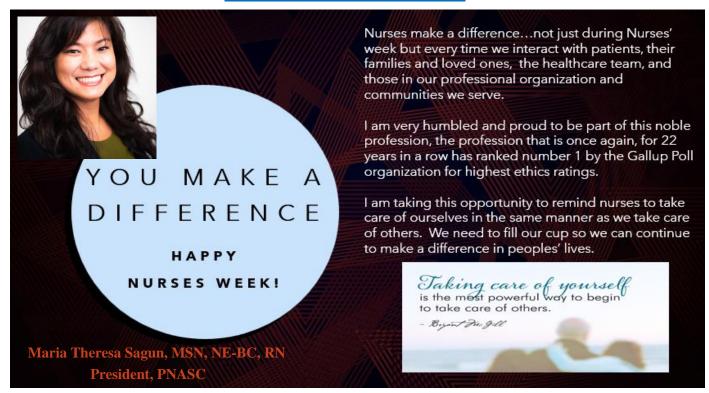

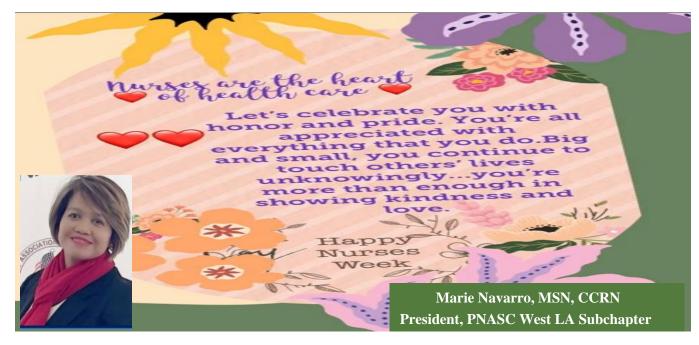

- ➤ Masters' degree (MSN)
- **▶** Advanced Practice Registered Nurse (APRN)
  - Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist (CRNA) Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists provide a full range of anesthesia and pain management services.
  - Nurse Practitioner (NP) Nurse Practitioners provide primary, acute, and specialty health care across the lifespan through assessment, diagnosis, and treatment of illnesses and injuries.
  - Clinical Nurse Specialists (CNS) Clinical Nurse Specialists provide diagnosis, treatment, and ongoing
    management of patients; provide expertise and support to nurses caring for patients; and ensure use of best
    practices and evidence-based care to achieve the best possible patient outcomes.
  - Certified Nurse Midwives (CNM) Certified Nurse-Midwives provide primary, gynecological, and reproductive health care.
- > Nursing doctorate is the highest achievement in nursing education. Nurses with this degree are addressed as "doctor".
  - O Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) Practice-base, prepared nurses to improve health system performance and serve as executives, educators, researchers, or APRN with a large scope of practice.
  - o Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) Research-focused degree that prepared nurses to conduct research and lead the nursing profession.

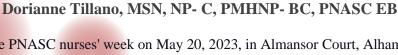

The PNASC nurses' week on May 20, 2023, in Almansor Court, Alhambra, CA, was attended by 83 participants. The program objectives are to identify leadership actions/ways to realign current nursing practices, to understand the role of different determinants of health, to create a genuine diversified, equitable, and inclusive nursing practice, understand actions by nurse leaders that can improve nurses' ability to care for and meet the needs of the vulnerable and marginalized patient population at their respective practices or work areas and to identify the importance of nurses' life-long learning and its contribution towards improving academia and practice sector

collaboration to attributed to Future of Nursing 2020-2023: Realigning as a Nursing Organization to Promote Health Equity.



The event was an incredible success! Activities included the General Assembly, Research Presentation, Panel discussion, scholarships, awarding ceremony, and live entertainment. The event began with a breathtaking violin performance by Cameron Sagun, son of the PNASC President. Next, PNASC President Maria Sagun MSN, NE-BC, RN delivered an inspiring State of PNASC address, highlighting all the fantastic achievements in the fiscal year 2022-2023. Each committee chairperson presented their objectives, achievements, and goals to thunderous applause. The voting members of the



organization accepted all committee reports.

During the break, selected executive board members danced in their attire to the "Coconut Song".

The Education, Research Practice Committee also hosted an insightful panel discussion with six-panel speakers from the Nursing Administration, bedside, and academia who shared their expertise on the theme: The Future of Nursing 2020-2023: Realignment of Nursing Organizations to Promote Health Equity Through Nursing Education, Research and Practice.

The panel speakers were:

- Janette V. Moreno, DNP, NEA-BC, NPD-BC Director of Nursing Education, Geri and Richard Brawerman Nursing Institute Cedars-Sinai Medical
- Karen Retardo, MA, BSN, RN, ACC. She is an ICF certified coach, certified Gallup strengths coach, holistic healing practitioner, and clinician
- Peachy Hain, MSN, RN, NE-BC, FACHE. She is the executive director of nursing in the medical-surgical services at Cedars Sinai
- Joyce Leido, MSN, RN- NEA- BC, CPHIMS. She is the chief nurse executive at Kaiser Permanente, Los Angeles, CA
- Sharon D. Peralta, Ph.D., RN. She is the co-

chief of the mental health care group and a chief mental health nurse at the Tibor Rubin VA Medical Center in Long Beach, CA

• Dan Brothman, the Chief Executive Officer of Prime Healthcare.

The panel speakers acknowledged that to promote Health Equity Through Nursing Education, Research, and Practice; the nurse must learn to assess themselves, let go of harmful practices and instead foster a supportive, mentoring environment for each other despite our differences. When nurses work together, the patients and the healthcare industry prosper.

Dante Tolentino, Ph.D., RN-BC, FAMIA, is the Assistant Professor at the UCLA School of Nursing with a research interest in social justice informatics: examining and closing the health inequity gaps and technology disparities among minoritized groups, mainly Filipino Americans with Type II diabetes (T2D). He presented his qualitative study on the "Experiences of Filipino Americans with Type 2 Diabetes during COVID-19". His research found that despite several complex challenges during the pandemic, Filipinos coped using their existing resources-support. Many of them also made some diabetes self-management changes.

Velma Yep, DNP, GNP-BC, updated the attendees on Legislative Update AB765. This bill would, except as prescribed, make it a misdemeanor for a person who does not have a valid, unrevoked, and unsuspended certificate as a physician and surgeon to use the title doctor. It was an insightful talk. Indeed, a relevant topic, especially for doctoral prepared nurses!



During the lunch break, the attendees enjoyed the sumptuous meal. In addition, there were raffle prizes and an opportunity to network with the sponsors and vendors. In the afternoon part of the event, the Program and Awards committee recognized the scholarship award winners and High School Essay Writing Contest.





The Membership and Community Outreach Committee recognized the top membership recruiters and volunteers. In the back side of the event room, poster presentation on the nursing profession and research were participated by Sasha A. Rarang, Ph.D., MSN-Ed, CCM, RN, PMHNP student, Carmen N. Urbayan, DNP, RN, CNS, CPN, PCNS-BC and Maricar Gail Jones, DNP, RN-BC, CPHIMS, PHN.

A live band performed as a tribute to nurses, and the attendees lively danced and sang. The event was undoubtedly meaningful, bringing together healthcare professionals, especially nurses. Apart from the event's fun aspect, there were vital learning points. Nurses got to interact and learn from each other's experiences. They also had the opportunity to learn about the challenges facing the healthcare industry, especially during the current global pandemic and these current times. # Congratulations to 2023 Nursing Scholarship Awardees



Advance Practice Nurse Scholar of the Year - Sasha Rarang, PhD, MSN, CCM, RN Dr. Sasha A. Rarang, was nominated by Ms. Antonette Nunez, PNASC Recording Secretary. Dr. Rarang is currently enrolled in Psychiatric/Mental-Health nurse practitioner (PMHNP) program at West Coast University. She was motivated to pursue the PMHNP certification program in mid-2022 due to her societal commitments and understanding of the lack of individuals who can congruently understand the flight of transgender individuals and their mental health needs.

Her advocacy includes: to serve those who needs assurance. To be able to represent the transgender people in nursing practice with their mental health needs whether to health them diagnose, treat, as well as care for their existing mental problem or in the process of their own transitioning is significant in promoting equity and inclusivity in healthcare.

Dr Rarang stated "I firmly believe that as a nurse, it is our duty and commitment to be the model of empathy and compassion. This is the essence of being a PNASC/PNAA nurse: to be able to advocate and be that instrument for a change and be that equity minded nurse. It is my dream and goal to be that nurse that can truly promote not only health among patients, but also be that nurse who can champion culturally congruent care among transgender individuals in treating and caring for their mental health issues." Regalado "Reggie" Valerio Jr., DNP, CRNA, CHSE PNASC President, 2018-2022

Regalado 'Reggie' Valerio Jr. is a certified registered nurse anesthetist (CRNA) at Los Angeles General Medical Center (LAGMC) and the simulation director at the USC Program of Nurse Anesthesia, Keck School of Medicine. Most recently, Dr. Valerio is named as the Advance Practice Nurse of the year and the merit recipient among the CRNAs at LAGMC in 2023.

As the director of simulation at USC, Dr. Valerio facilitates laboratory simulations on anesthesia planning, management, and delivery in a safe and controlled learning environment for nurse anesthesia residents. He also provides interdisciplinary simulations at LAGMC for OB-GYN, neurology, ER, and perioperative nursing services.

Dr. Valerio is currently an item writer for the National Certification Examination (NCE) at the National Board of Certification and Recertification for Nurse Anesthetists' (NBCRNA). He serves as an item writer for the self-evaluation exam (SEE) at NBCRNA. The SEE helps prepare anesthesia students for their NCE before entry to practice.

Shortly after he graduated from Duke University School of Nursing, he took a leadership position and became the president of PNASC for the term 2018-2020. His mantra for his executive term–PNASC RISE, which stands for his goals: **Recruit** & **Retain**, **Innovate** & **Inspire**, **Serve**, **Empower** & **Engage** PNASC owners/members. ## The Life of Ambulatory Care Nurses

Contrary to what most healthcare personnel perceive, ambulatory care nursing is much busier than you may think. Registered Nurses (RNs) have important roles in patient care departments such as the Emergency Room, Gastroenterology, Outpatient Surgery, Hematology/Oncology, Infusion, Wound, and Urgent Care. Most recently, there is a rising need for RNs to head nurse-led clinics in Adult Primary Care and in telehealth. The skills learned in the acute care setting are vital to safe patient outcomes in the Ambulatory Clinics. There is also an opportunity for nursing programs to add ambulatory nursing to the curriculum as it is a growing field. Many board certifications are available such as the American Academy of Ambulatory Care Nursing (AAACN).

In an article "Perspectives of Nurses Toward Telehealth Efficacy and Quality of Health Care: Pilot Study" (Perspectives of Nurses Toward Telehealth Efficacy and Quality of Health Care: Pilot Study - PMC (nih.gov)), one of the evolving roles of nurses as they take on new responsibilities of providing nursing service in home settings, is the use of information technology (IT). Telehealth nursing focuses on patients' long-term wellness, self-management, and health [1]. According to the American Telemedicine Association, this IT solution provides nursing care across a distance, empowering the care providers with the ability to monitor, educate, follow-up, collect data, and provide multidisciplinary care including remote interventions, pain management, and family support in an innovative fashion [7]. It has been reported that agencies using telehealth have an average patient-to-nurse ratio of 15:1, as compared with non-telehealth agencies having a ratio of 11:1 [7]. Therefore, telehealth nursing can make a tremendous difference in providing patient care, particularly in rural or underserved areas in states such as Nebraska, where there is generally a shortage of nurses and health care services, as well as resources can be limited [3].

It is an amazing experience for nurses to maximize their scope of practice by providing patient care in nurse led clinics. RNs can perform prenatal screenings, diabetic teaching and monofilament foot exams, administer medications per standing orders, and many others as covered by standardized procedures. Licensed Vocational Nurses (LVNs) are also highly utilized in nurse led clinics. Typical LVN duties are EKG, Blood Pressure checks, weight checks, vaccine administration, and recurring injections.



Telehealth offers nurses fully remote employment. RNs can triage patients over the phone and provide an appropriate disposition using a prescribed algorithm. LVNs can screen emails and phone messages sent to providers from patients, as well as stage messages for providers by pending medications and diagnostic tests or respond to the patient directly. The role of nursing in ambulatory care is rapidly growing and evolving. In a highly competitive market, having nurses provide hands on care allows patients to spend more time with their physicians to discuss their plan of care.

ethnic minority nurse leaders in areas of health policy, practice, education, and research; endorsement of best practice models of nursing practice, education, and research for minority populations.

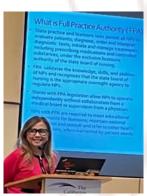

Fold and lock the banana and jackfruits, seal the wrap with water.

In a pan, heat the oil and add sugar until the sugar floats

Fry the wrapped bananas until golden brown.

Ingredients:

5 egg yolks

1 can condensed milk

½ can evaporated milk 1 tsp vanilla extract

1 cup sugar

Whisk the egg yolks in a large bowl. Add the condensed milk, evaporated milk, vanilla extract, then whisk well.

Melt the sugar in a saucepan. Do not burn. Pour about 2 tbsp of melted sugar in the molds. Pour all the whisked ingredients in the same molds with the sugar.

Steam until all nothing sticks to the toothpick when poked.

The documentary showcases the story of Filipino nurses

in New York City and Los Angeles who have been on the front lines of the COVID-19 crisis since the pandemic began. It highlights the sacrifices they have made including leaving their families behind, working long hours, and risking their lives to care for others. Other topics touched upon were the history of Filipino nurses migrating to America, anti-Asian hate

#### **Nursing Workforce Programs**

For decades, ANA has actively advocated for increases in the Nursing Workforce Development Programs and the National Institute of Nursing Research (NINR). Title VIII Nursing Workforce Development Programs received \$300.472 million in this package. This is a \$20 million increase over Fiscal Year (F.Y.) 2022 enacted levels.

#### **Opioids**

ANA Chief Nursing Officer, Debbie Hatmaker, is pleased to report that H.R. 7666, the Restoring Hope for Mental Health, and Well-Being Act of 2021, supports H.R. 1384, the Mainstreaming Addiction Treatment (MAT) Act. This legislation would eliminate the duplicative and burdensome requirement that providers, including APRNs, apply for a Drug Enforcement Administration waiver to dispense lifesaving buprenorphine to treat those suffering from opioid use disorder.

#### **Prescribing Authority**

ANA successfully led the charge in 2018 for nurse practitioners' permanent prescribing authority of medication-assisted treatment. A compromise was reached to give five years of prescribing authority to Certified Nurse-Midwives, Clinical Nurse Specialists, and Nurse Anesthetists who take additional continuing education in the SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Act of 2018.

#### **Telehealth**

The omnibus continues Medicare's expanded access to telehealth by extending COVID-19 telehealth flexibilities for an additional two years through Dec. 31, 2024.

#### **Pandemic Preparedness**

The Strategic National Stockpile to ensure critical pandemic supplies are ready to deploy, which s includes the replenishing sale/transfer mechanism that will provide helpful predictability for domestic manufacturing of personal protective equipment. The bill also supports the public health workforce by encouraging investments in the next generation of healthcare workers through grants and public health loan forgiveness.

#### Governor Inslee Signs Washington My Health, My Data Act into Law

In Olympia, WA, Governor Jay Inslee and Attorney General Bob Ferguson focused on reproductive and healthcare protections. One of the bills, House Bill 1155, the W.A. My Health, My Data Act, is a historic and first-in-the-nation solution aimed at protecting the personal health data of all Washingtonians. Introduced by Rep. Vandana Slatter, D-Bellevue, it also protects the health data of individuals who visit Washington seeking health care, such as reproductive and gender-affirming services.

At its core, House Bill 1155 will modernize Washington's consumer protection framework to regulate better private health data collection, sharing, and sale. Currently, websites, apps, and health-tracking devices lack basic data privacy protections, much less the protections we expect for sensitive personal health data. Most consumers are completely unaware of it and have no way to consent to the collection and sharing of their private information. In the aftermath of regressive policies passed by neighboring states and a significant reversal of the Roe decision by the U.S. Supreme Court, this bill is an urgent and critical step to protect the privacy of personal health care decisions.

**Nurse Practitioners (NPs):** According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics nurse practitioners are at the forefront of diagnosis, research, and treatment to ensure patients have access to quality health care. America's 355,000 licensed NPs conduct more than 1 billion patient visits annually.

#### **Five Trends to Watch**

- Demand for NPs Is Growing Along with the NP Role With an aging U.S. population, the rising incidence of chronic disease, and increasing infectious disease rates, NPs are in high demand and NPs are trusted by their patients. NPs top the list projected to grow the fastest over the next decade, with projected growth of nearly 46% by 2031 according the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.
- 2. Nearly 100 Million People Now Live in Primary Care Shortage Areas and the Numbers Are Rising According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), 99 million Americans lack adequate access to primary care a nearly 20% jump from one year ago and shortages are more severe in rural areas. A recent survey by American Association of Nurse Practitioners (AANP) found that nearly 50% of patients waited longer than one month and 25% reported waiting more than two months for a healthcare appointment in the last 12 months. NPs are poised to address this challenge, with almost 90% of NPs trained to deliver primary care. NPs represent 1 in 4 primary care providers in rural practices, with an even more significant percentage in the states that allow them to practice to the full extent of their education and clinical training.
- 3. NPs Are Taking on Leadership Roles in Research and the Diagnosis and Treatment of Illnesses —NPs served on the front lines throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, which continues as communities face a tri demic of COVID-19, influenza, and respiratory syncytial virus (RSV). NPs are leading the effort to diagnose and treat illnesses of all types and participating in research to develop new treatments and combat emerging diseases.
- 4. More States Are Giving Patients Full and Direct Access to NPs. This allows NPs to practice at the top of their education and clinical training and allows patients to benefit more fully from the care NPs provide. New York and Kansas took action; 26 states, the District of Columbia, and two U.S. territories have Full Practice Authority (FPA) laws in place. States that have adopted FPA are ranked among those achieving the best health system performance, access to care, and patient health outcomes in the nation. In most states, outdated licensure laws reduce or restrict patient access to NPs. In January 2023, California joined these States with FPA.
- 5. **Mental Health NPs Are Increasing Access to Mental Health Services**. A <u>study</u> published in 2022 found that the number of NPs treating Medicare beneficiaries for psychiatric and mental health conditions grew 162% between 2011 and 2019, compared with a 6% decrease in the number of psychiatrists treating Medicare patients. Results from this study also indicated, "... in 2019, these NPs provided 34% and 51% of mental health office visits for [Medicare beneficiaries] in urban and rural areas with the full scope of practice regulations." The study concludes, "PMHNPs are a rapidly growing workforce that may be instrumental in improving mental health care access."

# Diversity in Nursing Profession: PNASC Member's Personal Journey

Many years ago, when I first came out as Lesbian, my father warned me to be careful. He told me many were not open to "alternate lifestyles" and I may experience difficulties in the community and in my career, especially if I was "out". I was determined to prove him wrong. I identify as Lesbian and masculine or butch. Regardless of what I say or do, it is obvious to most that I am gay.

Growing up in the Southeastern United States was not always easy; I was often called names and even had things thrown at my car. When I entered nursing school, I was initially very careful about who knew I was gay, especially because I attended school in Georgia. However, as time went on, I became more and more comfortable sharing this part of my life. The world was changing. Upon graduation, I moved to Southern California to be with my long-term girlfriend of three years. When starting my career in the ICU, old habits from living in the Southeastern United States forced me to use discretion when speaking of my personal life. However, California was much different than anything I had ever experienced. It was a much more welcoming environment for a gay person. I quickly became much more comfortable and very openly "out". After spending several years in the ICU, I was promoted to Nursing Director. I worked for a Director of Nursing who did not understand why I wore suits and ties to work. She told me my manner of dress was inappropriate and offensive to patients and staff—a blatant violation of my right to gender expression, a protected class in the State of

California. I was truly surprised at this incident, especially coming from a colleague and fellow Registered Nurse. After all, as nurses, we see everything and take care of everyone. I discussed this with the Chief Nursing Officer, who fully supported me. This incident would never happen again.

The world has continued to change and become a safer, more welcoming place for the LGBTQIA2S+ community. I have been completely "out" to everyone for more than two decades and I have seen such magnificent changes. After our community received the freedom to marry, I married my girlfriend in 2015. We have now been together for nearly 17 years. However, there is still so much work to be done to be able to provide a safe, welcoming community for the LGBTQIA2S+ population. The biggest thing I have learned is there is a significant knowledge deficit surrounding certain facets

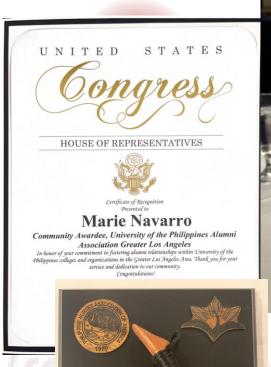

# Going Back to School to Become a Future PMHNP: A Path to Promoting Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion by Advocating the Underrepresented and Vulnerable Transgender Population in the Future

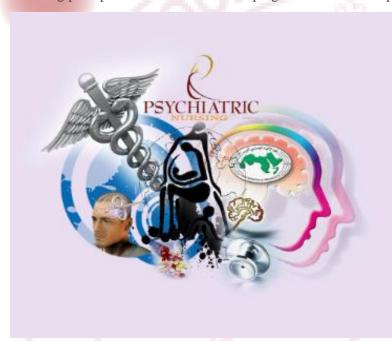
Becoming an equity minded nurse means not only having the desire to help and advocate for those who needs help but be that nurse who can help and advocate because you have the right knowledge and skills and ability to represent those whom you serve. One of the essences of becoming an equity minded nurse is to ensure that as a nurse, one can promote gender-affirming environment in his or her own nursing practices. Approximately 25 million people around the world identify as transgender individuals, the numbers are growing because of the changing mindset of the society about the concept of transgenderism. While the visibility of transgender communities has increased, significant healthcare disparities remain. Transgender individuals report being less inclined to share their sex assigned at birth due to fear of stigmatization and mistrust of the medical and health care community in general. The mistrust and inequity experienced by transgender individuals are not limited to clinical care and may extend to research as well as well as in education.

Deciding to go back to school and become anxious once again about learning new things, attending classes and clinical trainings, and especially getting all of the requirements for admission be submitted on time and become part of the thriving number of nurses entering the world of Psychiatric/Mental-Health Nursing Nurse Practitioner occurred to mid-2022. Many of my friends and colleagues asked me "why are you doing this?" Well, the answer to that is simply, I am determined to be the best nurse I can be and to be that person of knowledge and skills who will be able to advocate for those who needs assistance the most, the transgender individuals who may suffer from their trauma and difficulties as individuals. To advocate for them, it requires not only an assurance, but an individual who is experience with their situation and can empathize when nobody cannot. It is one of the immense deeds I may be able to do as a nurse, to serve the transgender communities as a professional healthcare provider equipped with not only the desire to help but with appropriate knowledge and skills.

To be able to provide representation for the transgender people in nursing practice and as future advance practice nurse is another way of advocating by becoming a role model. Having a transgender person like them, who is available to help and equipped with the right knowledge and skills in assisting them with their mental health care needs whether to help them with their diagnosis, treat them, as well as caring for their existing mental problems or assist them in the process of their own transitioning is significant in promoting gender-affirming healthcare environment, a way to promote health equity for all. The ability to not only represent, but to be there and truly work with transgender individuals with their mental health needs is a societal commitment. The lack of individuals who can congruently understand the flight of transgender

individuals and their mental health needs drove me to go back to school and enter the world of clinical nursing once again. At this time not as nurse leaders only, but as an advance practice nursing student who in the future can completely advocate for the vulnerable and underrepresented transgender individuals in our society as their primary care provider.

To study Psychiatric/Mental-Health Nursing and be license or certified as future PMHNP, I have to enroll in an accredited program recognized by the California Board of Registered Nursing as well as accredited by the Commission of Collegiate Nursing Education program (CCNE). The Post-MSN Psychiatric Mental-Health Nursing program of one outstanding university is a combination on an online (didactic) learning and 500 hours actual clinical experience under the preceptorship of qualified and willing Licensed PMHNP, Psychiatrist, or Clinical Psychologist. Finding a willing and nurturing preceptor who is inclined at helping others to become part of this practice is not easy. Hours of writing letters and



sending information to multiple mental health practitioners can be daunting and seem endless. However, if one's yearning is true and positive towards helping others, the Almighty father is always there to guide and put you to a proper direction. I am thankful to one of my colleagues at the Philippine Nurses Association of Southern California (PNASC), Inc. for directing me to one of her friends to accept me for my clinical. My PNASC family supports me emotionally and supportive of my advocacies. With their cheers and support, I am positive that I can do this journey, no matter how much it would take me (time, effort, and money) to complete this endeavor to ensure that another nurse, another health warrior for diversity, equity, and inclusion can be made and be that instrument for change for others.

I firmly believe that as a nurse, it is our duty and commitment to be the model of empathy and compassion. This is what makes the best nurse and can make the most dramatic difference in our patients' lives especially when they are at their most vulnerable situation. I would like to end my narrative by thanking PNASC and our mother organization, the Philippine Nurses Association of America for this opportunity that an individual who needs support to further his/her causes in order to help others can become a reality through the grant that these two organizations provide. **Kudos to PNASC and Mabuhay PNAA**.

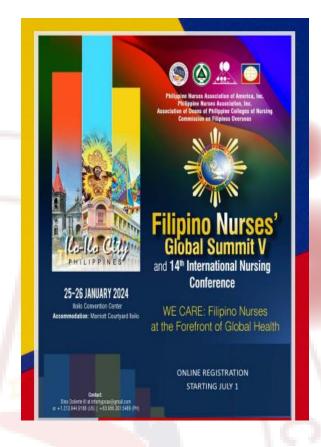

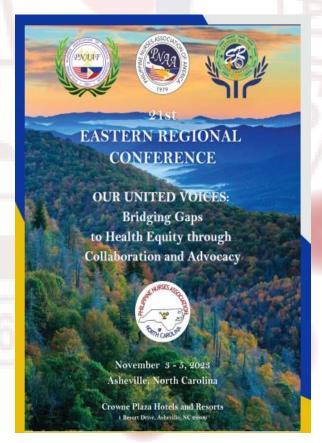
